Over the course of reading the script, my boyfriend lost his father to cancer. While being with Zach and his family in Mikey's final days, I witnessed them overcome waves of pain, and the strength of their faith, stubbornness, and love. Through this, I realized QMRS was a chance for audiences to see they are not alone in their battles.

Directing in COVID was like surfing. It started calm, then it was stop, go, fall, get up, distance, and repeat. It took just as much- if not more- thought, communication, and energy as any full-length show I've been involved in, and am grateful for all that was given during this process. The actresses joined QMRS with a variety of experience, personality, and purpose. What an amazing, patient, and talented trio! Wake wrote these characters as real women going through real things, providing an opportunity to experience bringing "truthfulness" to the stage. I would especially like to thank our Hawaiian Cultural Specialist Joshua "Baba" Tavares, who gave cast and production volunteers an opportunity to listen, unlearn, and relearn. Our cast, crew and advisor gave an astounding level of research and commitment to create these characters, and hope you find something to connect with in each of them. I also want to give a round of applause to QMRS stage manager, Raisa, who shared endless time and talent to our journey.

QMRS shines a light on how inspirational Rell was, both on and off her board. The script celebrates Hawaiian culture and language, while exploring universal themes from day-to-day life. 
